## Hannibal

Founded in 1819 by Moses D. Bates, the river town soon flourished as a principal docking port for steamboats, flatboats, and packet steamers traveling the upper Mississippi. By 1845, Hannibal had achieved city status and by 1860, the population had more than doubled, making it the second largest city and third largest commercial center in Missouri. Early industries that greatly influenced the city's growth included pork packing, soap and candle making, coopering, milling of lumber, and the railroad. As these diminished, other Hannibal business ventures took their place, including shoe manufacturing, button making, and cement production.



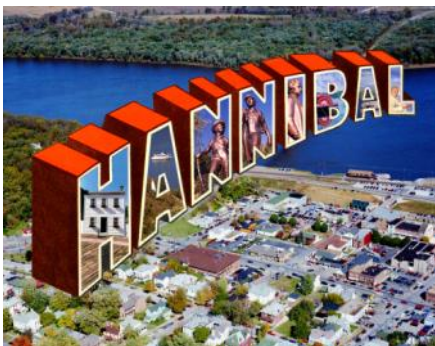
The city is proud of its long list of well-known sons and daughters including William Lear, designer of the Lear jet; Congressman William Henry Hatch; Navy Admiral Robert E. Coontz; sculptor John Rogers; Margaret Tobin, the "Unsinkable" Molly Brown; composer Egbert Van Alstyne; and artist Carroll Beckwith. Hannibal's most famous son is Samuel Langhorne Clemens, known worldwide by his pen name, Mark Twain. At the age of four, Sam's family moved to Hannibal from his birthplace in Florida, Missouri, about thirty miles to the southwest. Many of the popular characters featured in *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer*, *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*, and other beloved works, were based upon people Sam had known while growing up in Hannibal.

Today, we have more parks per citizen than most towns in the Midwest, and our trail system is growing yearly. Hannibal is a wonderful place to hike, or bike. Boaters will find easy access to the Mississippi, as well as

local lakes. Hannibal has grown into a thriving haven for artisans, and is included in the famous 50 Miles of Art. 50 Miles of Art includes a scenic drive on Highway 79 and focuses on the growing art communities of Hannibal, Louisiana and Clarksville. Hannibal is home to numerous world-class artists and craftsmen. Each year there are two studio tours (one in the Spring, and one in the Fall) that highlight artists and their studios.

If you like history, you'll love Hannibal. It's rich history comes to life when you walk the streets of downtown, or take a walking tour of Hannibal's beautiful historic homes.

Hannibal boasts a diverse industrial economy that includes the production of agricultural chemicals, food products, rubber and plastic products, electrical and automotive equipment, and various other manufactured goods. The many businesses in Hannibal provide friendly service, with a strong work ethic. You'll discover wonderful and unique shops that are found only in Hannibal. No matter what you choose to do you will find our town of nearly 18,000 very accommodating. I'm sure you will agree that Hannibal is a magical experience for individuals and families alike.



## Keynote Speaker



**Mary Helmer, President/Coordinator of Main Street Alabama** will provide this year's keynote. Prior to her position with MSA, Helmer spent ten years as a local Main Street Director in Emporia, KS. This experience forged a lifelong interest in downtown revitalization and community development. Following her tenure as Emporia's Main Street Director, Helmer moved into the position of Kansas Main Street State Coordinator in 2007 and served in that capacity for 5 years. Prior to accepting her current position with Main Street Alabama in 2013, Helmer developed a leveraged funding package and managed public relations on a project to convert a former high school into a hotel/convention center in Emporia. Since moving to Alabama and taking on the re-launch of the statewide coordinating program for Main Street Alabama, Mary has traveled the state extensively providing training and direct services to the Designated Main Street Alabama cities and Downtown Network communities, including incorporating the Downtown Design Guide and the Downtown Development Guide as key resource pieces for all communities interested in redeveloping their downtown and neighborhood commercial districts. Mary has served as a key-

note speaker/presenter at several events including Electric Cities Conference, Alabama League of Municipalities, Economic Development Association of Alabama, Alabama Communities of Excellence, Alabama Trust for Historic Preservation, EPA Community Framework Planning, Regional Planning Commission of Greater Birmingham, Eastern Alabama Regional Planning & Development, Pepper Place Charrette as well as several local Main Street and Chambers of Commerce Annual Meetings and service clubs.

## Tours

### Upstairs, Downtown

Get a behind the scenes look at some of the historic properties downtown Hannibal has to offer. This tour will include both homes as well as residential spaces in public buildings and commercial spaces.

### City of Palmyra

Join Jim Talley of Talley Classic Properties on a journey through the nearby city of Palmyra and see the many historic homes it has to offer.

### A Tour of Ilasco: An Immigrant Community in a Cement Company Town

Join David and Sally Polc of the Ilasco Area Historical Preservation Society on a tour of the historic resources remaining from the immigrant community of Ilasco. Ilasco developed as immigrants from Eastern Europe arrived in Hannibal to work at the Atlas Portland Cement Company Plant. The remaining resources are centered around Ilasco Trail, off Highway 79 about two miles south of Hannibal. They include a concrete jail and brick commercial store/tavern, both dating to about 1909, and a steel bridge over Marble Creek from 1910. Additional resources to visit include the site of the Ilasco schools, Ilasco Holy Cross Catholic Church, and Marble Creek Cemetery. Ethnic desserts will be available for tasting.

### Jim's Journey: The Huck Finn Freedom Center Tour

In a town that celebrates all things Twain, Jim's Journey recognizes one of Twain's most complex yet locally under-represented literary figures: Jim, the runaway slave and friend to Huck Finn. We all know Jim is a fictional character, but we have learned that he was based on a real person, Daniel Quarles. As Hannibal's first African American history museum, our mission is to honor Daniel Quarles' legacy and to glimpse what life was like for him, his descendants and other African Americans living in 19th- and 20th-century Hannibal. Explore Hannibal's newest museum with the director!

### Describing Historic Neighborhoods

Join Karen Bode Baxter and Esley Hamilton as they bus through Hannibal's Central Park and Maple Avenue historic districts, which reflect the city's heyday as a railroading and lumbering center. They will explain how they determined logical boundaries for the National Register districts, how they classified the architectural styles of the buildings, and how they distinguished original building features from alterations, some of which were historic in themselves.

### Cement Foundry Tour

Have you ever wondered what the difference was between cement and concrete? Learn about the local cement foundry and how the foundry and cement business shaped the greater Hannibal area.

## Tours/Workshops

### Historic Building Development Workshop

This advanced training workshop brings together industry experts and government officials to discuss issues impacting historic building development projects in Missouri, especially those utilizing historic tax credits:

- Understanding historic tax credit application procedures at the State Historic Preservation Office.
- Clarifying the detailed descriptions of your scope of work to speed the application review process
- Evaluating whether or not to insulate masonry walls
- Integrating contemporary building systems into historic buildings
- Determining when to call in a structural engineer
- Creating conservation districts to protect investments in historic buildings
- Identifying ways to maximize tax credits through detailing on invoices and overlooked project costs
- Finding more dollars for historic projects, large or small, with a variety of other tax credit programs
- Calculating whether to use a 24 or 60-month basis period and the nuances of phasing applications
- Considering how to identify additions and separate buildings for federal tax credit applications
- Identifying common procedural mistakes on federal tax credit applications
- Planning for maximum flexibility for historic building redevelopment projects
- Restoring and reconstructing missing historic features with today's materials

### Historic Stone Repair, Methods and Materials

This workshop brings together a building

conservator as well as a preservation architect who work extensively with the repair of stone on historic buildings to work alongside masons and a supplier of masonry tools and patching products to discuss the types of damage you are likely to encounter on stone in Missouri's buildings and to review the variety of methods and materials that can be utilized to repair damaged stone. This discussion will be followed by instruction and demonstrations in the proper way to apply patching compounds. *Participants should wear appropriate attire for working with stone and patching compound*

### Window Repair Workshop

Wood Window Repair will be a fun and intense three hour hands-on workshop about the repair & weatherization of historic double hung windows. Nationally known preservation trades artisan, author, former PBS host & educator Bob Yapp will be leading the workshop in the woodworking studio of his Hannibal based school, *The Belvedere School for Hands-On Preservation*.



### Maintaining Your Historic Property Workshop

Using the historic 8th & Center St. Baptist Church as a focus, we will look at developing preservation/maintenance techniques and strategies necessary to overcome deferred maintenance.

Matters also addressed include building inspection & survey, compiling a maintenance manual, developing long range preservation/

maintenance programs, and establishing a cyclical maintenance program and finally addressing fundraising.



### Old Baptist Cemetery Workshop

Join Gary Keshner at the Old Baptist Cemetery to learn about the best practices for cemetery maintenance. This will include a hands-on demonstration of how to clean stones as well as a demonstration of stone patching and easy ways to level stones. This workshop is open to individuals of all skill levels.



### Plaster Repair Workshop

This workshop will teach the basics of plastering and how to do your own plaster repair and patching. Learn the differences between plaster and drywall, the chemical reaction that takes

place as well as safety and simple short cuts to make work quick but still achieve outstanding results. Simple, repetitive exercises will be taught to give attendees command of the tools so they get more plaster on the walls and not themselves. This workshop will include hands-on patchwork on easels, texture matching and blending and an intro to 3 coat work. Expect an informal Q&A session while you get knee-deep in plaster. Be prepared to get dirty and no open-toed shoes!

### Restoration of Historic Faux Finishes, Gilding and Murals Workshop

Susan Greene, a renowned artisan in historic preservation, will be presenting a workshop on both wood graining and marbling.

The marble type that will be taught is a combination of Verde Aver and Verde Malachite. These provide learning techniques in both applying and removing the glaze to create veins and depth.

The wood type that will be taught is Crotch Cut Mahogany. This is a more difficult type of wood to replicate but techniques taught will provide knowledge into other types of faux wood graining techniques like oak and walnut.

Materials will be provided. Some may need to be shared. Come ready to create and get your hands a little dirty.

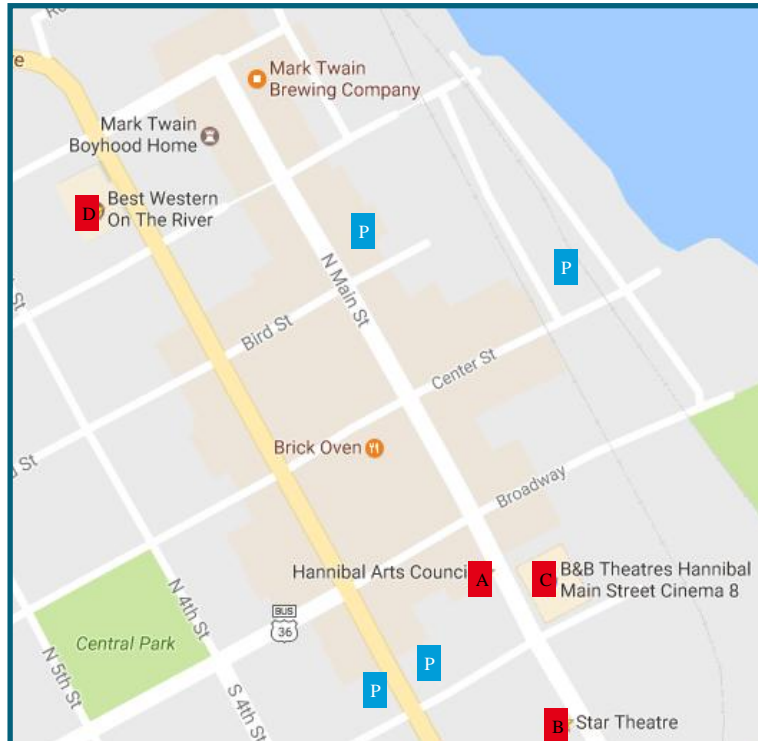
